PURPOSE OF OUR PLAN

With a commitment to group collaboration, Mt Toolebewong and District Landcare Group first developed an action plan in 1999. Our current plan, reviewed in 2019, will guide our activities over the next 5 years. We allocate time in group meetings to report on and review actions from the plan. We will review and update this plan in Winter 2024.

We share our plan with project partners, current and future, to effectively communicate our aspirations and priority areas of activity. This helps to develop collaborative projects that meet the needs of our group, our community and our partners.

HOW OUR PLAN WAS DEVELOPED

Our last review session was held on 24/8/19, facilitated independently and hosted by the Yarra Ranges Landcare Network. It was attended by Karen Garth and Hartmut Grieb. We developed a draft that was distributed to our group members for feedback. We reviewed and refined the plan and it was signed off at our AGM on 26/10/19

OUR GROUP WELCOMES YOU

We have 29 members and they include the Moora Moora Co-operative, Healesville Sanctuary, private landowners from Gruyere to Warburton, and as part of our junior landcare movement, Worawa College, Healesville High School, Badger Creek and Don Valley Primary Schools. Most of us have blocks with relatively intact areas of native bush, areas we wish to revegetate and streamside frontages to protect. Our landcare group fosters a community spirit and meets every few months to discuss issues.

We are a member of Victorian Landcare Inc, through which we obtain public liability insurance, and members receive quarterly Victorian Landcare magazines. We adhere to the LVI Code of Conduct and are supported locally by Yarra Ranges Council staff and have worked with Badger Creek Old School Building COM, Healesville Environment Watch Inc (HEWI), and the local Scouts and Guides on Clean Up Australia Days and planting projects in the community.

We are currently working with Melbourne Water and the shire to revegetate sections of the Coranderrk (Badger) Creek, and are advocating for a walking/cycling track along the creek between Don Rd and Badger Ck Rd. Our advocacy has now resulted in illegal fence extensions and structures removed from the south side of the creek and weed control work being done by contractors for Melbourne Water and DELWP. We are members of the Yarra Ranges Landcare Network, and Yarra Ranges Conservation Alliance.

Our wildlife sightings are entered into the Inaturalist database. We occasionally join the Victorian Field Naturalists and HEWI members when they have excursions in our area.

We have a rare orchid on a private property on Mt Toolebewong, and a few members have undertaken activities with the Victorian Orchid Society and DELWP to protect it. The location is kept private to protect the plant. In 2020 we will commence a project to erect Leadbeaters Possum and Brush-tailed Phascogale nest boxes on members' properties around Mt Toolebewong with suitable habitat.

Equipment and tools are available for members' use and include traps for cats/dogs/foxes/rabbits/Indian Mynas, spray units for poisoning of weeds, and a brush cutter. We have a library of useful magazines & books, and post events to our Facebook page. We prepare a Calendar of Events, and plan this in response to members' requests for information and training.
